From the Desk of Pastor Orin:

Dear Saints,

Easter Greetings in the name of our crucified, risen, and ascended Lord and coming Savior Jesus Christ!

If I did not know better, I would have assumed that Easter people are kids only. One could easily assume that they had no candy during the Lenten fast based on the sheer excitement of collecting eggs and candy left by the Easter Bunny. Thank God, Easter is so much more than the excitement the Bunny conjures up.

Looking out the windows from my living room, the thought of millions dying from inadequate fresh water or catastrophic flooding and pollution or lack of peace and security or hunger or war is remote. The above causes displacement of people, immense suffering, and death, but can also inspire empathy and enthusiasm for life affirming action.

When we are far removed from such realities, it is difficult even to imagine the need. However, with technology at a click of a button, we see and hear of the horrors people overseas experience. I agree that we are easily discouraged by such news, but we cannot ignore suffering and need.

As Easter people, we remember how the disciples felt when they saw the crowds and Jesus wanted them to feed the people. Instead of focusing on what was lacking, Jesus invited them to trust God. Granted that too is difficult, but we know God by what God does.

The risen Christ shows us that God is not an object or remote being. When Thomas encountered the risen Christ, he confessed that Jesus is truly man and truly God because of what He did. Thomas' experience of the risen Christ's love for him and his friends, offering of peace, gift of the Holy Spirit, and forgiveness was transformative and he became a faithful witness and servant of the Gospel.

Jesus showed that God is love by His sacrifice for our sins, and when our focus is on God's love, we can find our way through any situation as we did during COVID-19 or as Thomas did through grief.

In our self-sufficiency, we need to be reminded to live in love. Love for the neighbor is no small task. It makes us vulnerable, and our God did precisely that for our salvation. Now, God sends us to put our love in action for the sake of the neighbor.

If Easter means anything to us—kids, youth, adults and seniors, it is that the triumph of God's love in our lives makes us life-giving to a world in need. No longer are we overwhelmed just thinking about the world's problems or preoccupied with our own desires, needs, and interests. Instead, we put our faith in action through acts of loving service to the neighbor.

As we enjoy Easter candy, the suffering of our Ukrainian neighbors leaves a sour taste in our mouths. This we overcome by faith in loving action.

How We Can Help Ukrainians In Our Area

SUPPORT FOR UKRAINIAN REFUGEES ARRIVING IN OUR AREA

On Maundy Thursday, April 14, 2022, Messiah's Congregational Care Committee met and one of the items on the Agenda was "Ukrainian Refugees in our Area". A decision was made to investigate how members might fulfill Messiah's Mission Statement to *offer healing and care to all in need*, especially to Ukrainian refugees.

Ukraine was invaded on February 24, and since then we have witnessed eight weeks of carnage and devastation. Many of us have been asking, "What can we do to help?", as we see people fleeing with only a bag or small suitcase making their way through the rubble and all that's left of their home and city.

On April 16, Pastor Orin wrote to the pastor of a Slavic church in the Seminole/Holland neighborhood, "I believe we (Messiah) could help with displaced persons coming from Ukraine...Perhaps we could support this effort as a small gesture of compassion and love for the neighbor."

Now we have an opportunity to help by teaming up with local Slavic churches that are sponsoring refugees. These people, mostly families, have nothing when they arrive. Slavic churches are providing transportation to our area and are attempting to locate housing and needed essentials. The needs are truly great! For instance, the cost of housing is \$1200 – \$1500 per month in the Springfield, Ozark, Rogersville area.

Also, Slavic churches are assisting the refugees in becoming legal immigrants, a process which can easily take 3 months or more. In the meantime, refugees are not allowed to work or apply for any services. Things we take for granted like clothing, bedding, mattresses, bed frames, and hygiene essentials—bath soap, toothpaste, toothbrush, floss, body wash, shampoo, sponge, deodorant, razors and shaving cream are needed. In addition, towels, kitchen appliances, dishes and silverware, pots and pans, furniture, and the list goes on.

In order to simplify and help with the most immediate critical needs like food and housing when refugees arrive, a temporary designated account – **Ukrainian Refugee Fund** – has been set up at Messiah. Members who wish to donate to the local refugee relief can place their check or cash in an envelope labeled **Ukrainian Refugee Fund**. Checks should be made payable to Messiah Lutheran Church and marked **Ukraine** on the memo line. Look for **Ukrainian Refugee Fund** envelopes in the pews. Donations can be placed in the offering plate or brought or mailed to the church office.

Most of the volunteers from the Slavic churches receiving refugees speak Ukrainian and Russian fluently and are able to offer assistance that others in the community cannot. Since each family's needs for clothing and other items will be specific to that family, having the funds available will simplify meeting needs as quickly as possible. Donating items such as those listed above would mean they would have to be stored at the church, thus the fund for monetary gifts.

Home Safety Part 2 — Special Populations

**Children

Children, especially young children, will put just about anything they can find into their mouths. Water poses increased risks to young children. They are also in danger of accidents.

Ingestion:

All batteries, especially button batteries, can cause choking or other serious injuries. Keep them out of reach of children.

Laundry/dishwasher pods often look like candy with bright colors. Store these where they can't be seen.

Household cleaners/insect repellent/bug sprays are poisonous even in small amounts. All medications should be in child proof containers and out of reach.

Some plants can be poisonous. Check with Poison control (1(800)222-1222) for a complete list.

Drowning:

Small children can drown in just a few inches of water. Never leave a young child alone in a bath—even for a short time. Gather supplies before child is in the bath tub.

All children should be supervised by an adult at all times while in or around a pool. A drowning child may not call out or flail arms if in trouble.

All children should be taught pool safety/ swimming lessons as early as possible.

Accidents:

Any unstable furniture and flat screen TVs should be properly anchored to the wall to prevent them from tipping over and falling on a child.

Toys should be age appropriate and inspected for sharp points or broken areas before use by children.

Firearms should be secured in a gun safe with ammunition securely stored elsewhere. Don't trust children not to touch a gun if they find one.

Place pots with boiling water or grease for frying on back burners of the stove where children can't reach.

Home Safety (Continued)

**PERSONS WITH DEMENTIA

Depending on the severity or stage of the dementia, persons with Dementia present various levels of concern in the home . The following suggestions are in addition to the recommendations for elderly safety at home that were included in the Spirit last month.

Install alarms that notify the caretaker when a door or window is opened.

Hide a spare key outside the house in case the person with dementia locks the doors while caretaker is outside.

Keep all medications, both prescription and over the counter, in a locked box.

Keep all cigarettes, matches, lighters, and other fire hazards out of reach and sight.

Avoid clutter which can cause anxiety and confusion.

Lock all guns or remove the firing pins. Keep weapons and ammunition out of reach and out of sight.

Install child-proof latches on drawers or storage cabinets where items such as knives, cleaning products or other dangerous items can be found.

Consider removing the lock from bathroom doors to avoid person with dementia from getting locked in the bathroom.

Set the water heater at 120 degrees to avoid scalding with hot water.

Keep toxic materials (paint, fertilizer, gasoline, etc.) or dangerous items (tools, lawnmowers, sports equipment, etc.) locked in an outdoor shed or garage.

If possible, keep laundry room door locked or keep laundry products in locked box.

Keep autos, motorcycles and bicycles locked and ensure that the keys are secured.

Heating pads, electric blankets, electric mattress pads should be avoided if possible to avoid the risk of burns.

Consider using a monitoring device (like those used to hear infants) to alert caretaker to any sounds of distress or falls, especially during the night.


